


Chicago Manual of Style Guide (Notes and Bibliography)


There are two types of Chicago citation styles: **notes and bibliography** and **author-date**. In the **notes and bibliography** system, sources are cited in numbered **footnotes**. Each note corresponds to a **raised (superscript) number** in the text. Sources are also usually listed in a **separate bibliography**. In this guide, we will cover how to insert a footnote, the differences between a footnote and bibliography entry, some examples of each for different sources.

How to Insert a Footnote


Step 1: Once you have finished writing a sentence that requires a citation, click on the **References** tab.



Step 2: Under the References tab, click on **Insert Footnote.** Make sure your cursor is at the end of the sentence you want to cite.



Step 3: Once you click on Insert Footnote, you will see a **raised superscript number** appear where your cursor is as well as a **numbered footnote** at the bottom of the page.



Step 4: Write the footnote beside the footnote number.

According to John Smith, many farmers are seeing a decline in economic growth.¹

What is the difference between a footnote and a bibliography entry?

Footnotes and bibliography entries contain the same information; however, there are some stylistic differences between the two.

Footnote:

Sam Smith, *The History of Wildlife Photography* (New York: Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2006), 87.

In the footnote:

- 1. The author's name appears with the **first name first** and the **last name second** followed by a comma.
- 2. There are (parentheses) around the publication information.
- 3. **Specific page numbers** are included.
- 4. Footnotes are **numbered**.
- 5. Footnotes appear at the **bottom of the page**.

Bibliography entry:

Smith, Sam. *The History of Wildlife Photography.* New York: Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2006.

In the bibliography entry:

- 1. The author's name appears with the last name first followed by a comma, then the first name followed by a period.
- 2. There are NO parentheses.
- 3. There are **NO page numbers**.
- 4. The entire bibliography appears on a **separate page** at the end of the paper. It should be the **last** page of your paper.
- 5. The bibliography is arranged in **alphabetical order** by the author's last name.
- 6. The bibliography is **NOT numbered**.
- 7. **Double space** BETWEEN entries.
